SEASIDE PARK — A handful of striped bass were caught over the weekend to buoy angler's hopes as the season errers its fourth week.
"One robin doesn't make the spring," said El (Cap) Colvin, tackle dealer here, yesterday.
"But you've got to start somewhere." And that's what it appeared to be over the weekend — a start.

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Dr. Irving Baer, Toms River, broke the ice in the Barnegat Bay fishery as far as weigh-ins at Colvin's were concerned.

His six-pound bass was the first bay bass "I've seen," Colvin said. It was caught on a Rapalla in four feet of water on the Island Beach flats.

Colvin said he wasn't certain where Baer was fishing but it was assumed he was working the flats along the northern half of the island. The fish was half full of tiny grass shrimp.

Another fish caught yesterday was a 14½-pounder taken in the surf by George Yankus, Philadelphia. He fished near the end of the road on the state park.

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Yankus used blood worms. His fish takes the lead in the Seaside Park Tournament of Fish.
